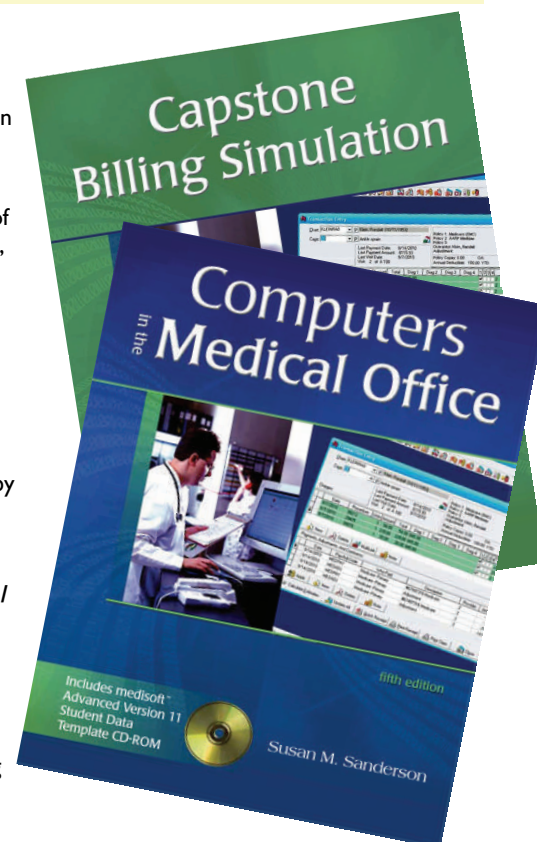

## Reducing Medication Errors

Medication errors are a tragedy, yet they occur daily in health care facilities. Errors are a significant cause of morbidity and

mortality in patients, and the root of many lawsuits. These errors are not only heartbreaking for the patient and the family members; they can be devastating for the healthcare professional. This is why prevention of errors is so critical.

The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO) and the Institute for Safe Medication Practices (ISMP) research medication errors. Their research has provided insight into the causes of medication errors thus providing information on how to prevent them. Both of these organizations agree; errors can be reduced if individuals and organizations report medications errors that occur and act to prevent these errors from being repeated.

Dose miscalculations are a common cause of medication errors as identified by JCAHO and ISMP. These errors are a violation of one of the seven patient rights of medication administration—right dose. To prevent

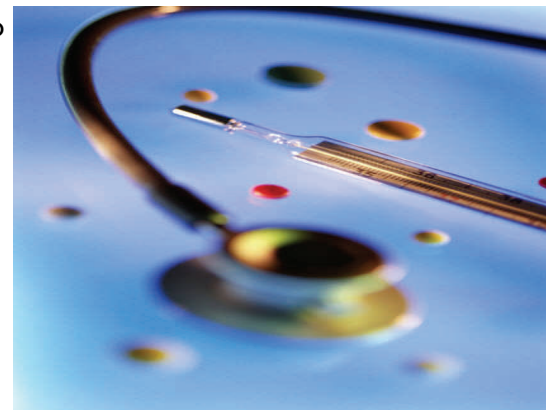
these types of errors, health care professionals must be properly educated in how to calculate the right dose at all times. There should be no question, just perfection.

Math and dosage calculations can be a struggle so all types of learners must be considered when this skill is being learned.

Since there are various accurate ways to obtain the correct dose, introducing learners to various methods of dosage calculations allow them to choose the one method that suits their personal learning style and comfort zone.

The Booth/Whaley Math and Dosage Calculations text makes it easy for the learner by providing instruction in four methods of dosage calculations, including formula, ratio-proportion, fraction-proportion, and dimensional analysis. These methods are each simply introduced and color-coded throughout the text. ## Ask the Author

**Do MHHE Medical Insurance texts include Medicare Part D coverage?**

Our texts for Medical Insurance provide instruction for processing insurance claims primarily in ambulatory care. Medicare Part D coverage is for drugs typically dispensed in pharmacies. Therefore, our texts do not need to include instruction on Medicare Part D.

According to Cynthia Newby, CPC, author of many of our

medical insurance texts, "our texts won't cover Part D because it is prescription drug coverage and is administered by health plans directly with patients and working with pharmacies. The impact on the office is that the physician has more formularies to deal with when writing Rx, and may have a pile of new and changing approved drugs for Medicare patients as a result.

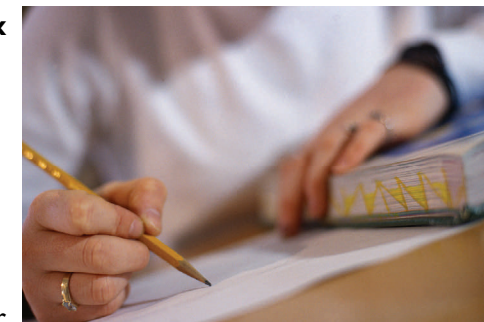
But the medical office is not going to deal with these claims, payments, drug cards, or any other parts of the process."
